## 1. The Basics

## Your Phone



## Key Features

1. Earpiece lets you hear the caller and automated prompts.
2. Main Screen displays all the information needed to operate your phone, such as the call status, the Contacts list, the date and time, and the signal and battery strength.
3. Softkeys let you select softkey actions or menu items corresponding to the bottom right/left line on the main screen.
4. Navigation Key lets you navigate quickly and easily through the menu options. These keys can also be reassigned to create customized shortcuts. Default settings are: Right: Contacts, Left: My Favourites, Up: Messaging, and Down: My Downloads.
5. MENU/OK Key lets you access the phone's menus and select menu options.
6. Camera Key lets you access the Pictures menu and take pictures.
7. TALK Key lets you place or receive calls, answer Call Waiting, use Three-Way Calling, or activate Voice Dial.
8. SPEAKER Key lets you place or receive calls in speakerphone mode or turn the speakerphone on and off during a call.
9. Microphone allows other callers to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
10. Keypad lets you enter numbers, letters, and characters, and navigate within menus. Press and hold keys 2-9 for speed dialing.
11. END/POWER Key lets you turn the phone on/off, end a call, or return to standby mode. While in the main menu, it returns the phone to standby mode and cancels your input.
12. BACK Key lets you display the previous page or clear characters from the screen.
13. Headset Jack allows you to plug in an optional headset for convenient, hands-free conversations. CAUTION! Inserting an accessory into the incorrect jack may damage the phone.
14. Camera Lens, as part of the built-in camera, lets you take pictures.
15. Speaker lets you hear different ringers and sounds. The speaker also lets you hear the caller's voice in speakerphone mode.
16. LED Indicator shows your phone's connection status at a glance.
17. Outer Screen lets you monitor the phone's status and see who's calling without opening the phone.
18. Micro-USB Connector allows you to connect a phone charger or other accessories to your phone. CAUTION! Inserting an accessory into the incorrect connector may damage the phone.
19. Volume Key allows you to adjust the ringer volume in standby mode or adjust the voice volume during a call. To mute the ringer during an incoming call, press the volume key up or down. The volume key can also be used to scroll up or down to navigate through the different menu options.
20. Side Camera Key lets you access the camera mode and take pictures.
21. Internal Antenna facilitates reception and transmission. To maximize call performance, do not obstruct the internal antenna area. (See page 11.)

## Turning Your Phone On and Off

## Turning Your Phone On

- Press Evoo.

Once your phone is on, it displays "Looking for service..." which indicates that your phone is searching for a signal. When your phone finds a signal, it automatically enters standby mode. At this point, you are ready to begin making and receiving calls.

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. When a signal is found, your phone automatically returns to standby mode.

In Power Save mode, your phone searches for a signal periodically without your intervention. You can also initiate a search for service by pressing any key (when your phone is turned on).

Tip: The Power Save feature helps to conserve your battery power when you are in an area where there is no signal.

## Turning Your Phone Off

- Press and hold eno for two seconds until you see the powering down animation on the display screen.

Your screen remains blank while your phone is off (unless the battery is charging).

## Using the Battery

## Installing the Battery

1. Insert the battery into the opening on the back of the phone, making sure the connectors align (1)). Gently press down to secure the battery (2)).
2. Replace the battery cover into the position as indicated in the diagram, and slide it upward until you hear a click (3).


## Removing the Battery

Warning! Do not handle a damaged or leaking Li-lon battery as you can be burned.

1. Make sure the power is off so that you don't lose any stored numbers or messages.
2. Press the battery release latch (1)), and then slide the battery cover downward and remove it (2)).
3. Lift up the battery and remove it from the phone (3).


## Charging Your Battery

Your phone comes with a rechargeable battery. You should charge the battery as soon as possible so you can begin using your phone.

Keeping track of your battery's charge is important. If your battery level becomes too low, your phone automatically turns off and you will lose all the information you were just working on. For a quick check of your phone's battery level, glance at the battery charge indicator located in the upper-right corner of your phone's display screen. If the battery charge is getting too low, the battery icon $\square$ appears and the phone displays a warning message.

Always use a manufacturer-approved charger to charge your battery.

Warning! Using the wrong battery charger could cause damage to your phone and void the warranty.

Note: Long backlight settings, searching for service, vibrate mode, and browser use affect the battery's talk and standby times.

## Using the Phone Charger

1. Plug the charger into a wall outlet.
2. Open the micro USB connector cover located on the upper left side of your phone.
3. Plug the other end of the charger into the micro USB connector (with the battery installed).

- A red indicator light means the battery is charging.
- A green indicator light means charging is completed.


## NavigatingThrough the Menus

The navigation key on your phone allows you to scroll through menus quickly and easily.

To navigate through a menu, simply press the navigation key up or down. If you are in a first-level menu such as Settings, you may also navigate to the next or previous first-level menu by pressing the navigation key right or left.

For a diagram of your phone's menu, please see "Menu Navigation" on page 56.

## Selecting Menu Items

As you navigate through the menu, menu options are highlighted. Select any numbered option by simply pressing the corresponding number on the phone's keypad. You may also select any item by highlighting it and pressing .

For example, if you want to display your volume settings:

1. Press to access the main menu.

Note: You can select List View or Grid View for your phone's menu style (see "Changing the Phone's Menu Style" on page 31).
2. Select Settings by pressing mas (in List view) or by highlighting it and pressing
3. Select Sounds by pressing anc $\mathbf{2}$ or by highlighting it and pressing (\%).
4. Select Volume by pressing 『1 or by highlighting it and pressing (
5. Select Ringer by pressing ©1 or by highlighting it and pressing (

Note: For the purposes of this guide, the above steps condense into "Select (\% ${ }^{*}$ > Settings > Sounds > Volume > Ringer."

## Displaying Your Phone Number

- Select number and other information about your phone will be displayed.)

Tip: You can also display your phone number through the Contacts menu.
Select > Settings > More... > Contacts > My Name Card. To send your contact information using Bluetooth, press Options (right softkey) $>$ Send Card.

## Making and Answering Calls

## Holding Your Phone

To maximize performance, do not obstruct the internal antenna area while using the phone.


## Making Calls

## To place a call using your keypad:

1. Make sure your phone is on.
2. Enter a phone number from standby mode. (If you make a mistake while entering, press to delete one digit at a time. Press and hold then delete the entire number.)
3. Press talk or and.
4. When you're finished, press eno or close the phone.

Tip: You can also place calls from your phone by using speed dialing (page 19), your History listings (page 60), and by using Automatic Speech Recognition (ASR, page 85).
To redial your most recent call, press talk twice.

## Dialing Options

Dialing options are displayed when you press Options (right softkey) after entering numbers in standby mode.

- Abbrev. Dial to use the Abbreviated Dialing feature. (See "Setting Abbreviated Dialing" on page 44 and "Using Abbreviated Dialing" on page 20.)
- Save to save the phone number in your Contacts. (See "Saving a Phone Number" on page 17.)
- P Hard Pause to insert a hard pause. (See "Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers with Pauses" on page 18.)
- T 2-Sec. Pause to insert a 2-second pause. (See "Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers with Pauses" on page 18.)


## Answering Calls

## To answer an incoming call:

1. Make sure your phone is on. (If your phone is off, incoming calls go to voicemail.)
2. Press talk or to answer an incoming call.

Your phone notifies you of incoming calls in the following ways:

- The phone rings and/or vibrates.
- The LED flashes.
- The backlight illuminates.
- The screen displays an incoming call message.
- If available, the phone number of the caller is displayed.
- If the phone number is in your Contacts, the Contacts entry's name is displayed.
The following options are also displayed by pressing Options (right softkey).
- Answer to answer the call.
- Answer:Speaker to answer the call in speakerphone mode.
- SelectAudio to switch the call to your desired device (if available).
- Answer on Hold to put the call on hold. (See "Setting Answer on Hold" on the next page.)
- Screen Call to answer the call by using pre-recorded announcement. (See "Setting Up Screen Call" on page 91.)
- Quiet Ringer to mute the ringer. (This feature appears when the ringer is set.)
- Ignore with Text to ignore the call and send a text message to the caller (if available).

Tip: Your phone offers additional ways to answer calls. (See page 44 for "Call Answer Mode" and 43 for "Auto Answer Mode".)

## Setting Answer on Hold

This feature allows you to hold an incoming call when you cannot answer immediately.

## To set Answer on Hold:

- When you receive an incoming call, press Options (right softkey) > Answer on Hold.
(The caller hears a message while waiting for you to answer. $\sigma_{\mathrm{H}}$ will display on the screen while the call is on hold.)

To resume the call:

- Press Answer (left softkey) or talk.


## Ending a Call

- Close the phone or press


## Missed Call Notification

When an incoming call is not answered, the missed call log is displayed on your screen.

To display the missed call entry from the notification screen:

- Select the entry and press (Select an option to continue.)

Tip: If you have two or more notifications, the Missed Alerts list will appear.
To display the Missed Alerts list from standby mode:

1. Select (\%) > Missed Alerts.
2. Select the entry you wish to view and press

## Calling Emergency Numbers

You can place calls to 911 (press © © 9 (Talk), even if your phone is locked or your account is restricted. Once the connection is established, press Options (right softkey) to display 911 options:

- Speaker On to activate speakerphone mode. (If you are in speakerphone mode, the option will appear as Speaker Off to deactivate.)
- Unlock MyPhone to unlock your phone (appears only if the phone is locked).

Tip: Press My Phone (left softkey) to display your phone number during an emergency call.

## Emergency mode options:

If you end the emergency call by pressing Evod, your phone enters the Emergency mode. Press Options (right softkey) to display the Emergency mode options:

- Call 911 to call 911 again.
- Call 911:Spkr. to call 911 in speakerphone mode.
- Exit Emergency to exit Emergency mode.

Note: Emergency mode automatically times out after 5 minutes.

## In-Call Options

During a call, your phone displays menu options by pressing Options (right softkey).

- Three-Way Call to call a third party.
- Main Menu to display the phone's main menu.
- Save to save the currently used phone number in your Contacts.
- ContactDetails appears if the number is already in your Contacts.
- Contacts to display your Contacts list.
- Call Memo Rec. to record the phone's conversation.
- Phone Info to access the Phone Info menu.
- Transfer Audio to switch the call to an external device (if applicable).

Tip: To return to the in-call screen from the main menu, etc., press
TALK.
During a call, both the left softkey and the side camera key function as a mute key. Press either one to mute the phone's microphone for privacy. Press it again to unmute it.

Warning! Due to higher volume levels, do not place the phone near your ear during speakerphone use.

During a call, use the volume key or press the navigation key up or down to adjust the receiver volume.

## End-of-Call Options

Once you have finished your call, the phone will display the Recent History. From the Recent History, you can view the date and time of the call, the phone number (if available), the entry name (if the number is already in your Contacts), and the duration of the call.

- Press Options (right softkey) to display the Recent History options. (See "History Menu Options" on page 59 for details.)
- Press Send Msg (left softkey) to send a text or picture message to the entry in the Recent History.

Note: Some options may not be displayed for calls identified as No ID or Restricted.

## Saving a Phone Number

Your phone can store up to 300 Contact entries with up to 500 total numbers. Each entry's name can contain 64 characters. Your phone automatically sorts the Contacts entries alphabetically. (For more information, see "Contacts" on page 63.)

1. Enter a phone number and press 0ptions (right softkey) > Save.
2. Select New Entry or Existing Entry.

- New Entry to create a new Contacts entry for the number.
- Existing Entry to save the number to an existing entry.
(This step is not necessary on the very first entry in your Contacts.)

3. If New Entry was selected, select a phone type, and then use the keypad to enter the new entry name and press (\%'。

- or-

If Existing Entry was selected, select an existing entry to which you want to save the number, and then select a phone type and press
4. Press Done (left softkey).

## Finding a Phone Number

You can search Contacts entries for phone numbers that contain a specific string of numbers.

1. Enter the last three or more digits of the number in standby mode. (The more numbers you enter, the more specific the search becomes.)
2. All Contacts entries matching the entered numbers will be displayed. Highlight the entry and press Talk to dial the number.

## Dialing and Saving Phone Numbers with Pauses

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as voicemail or credit card billing numbers.

There are two types of pauses available on your phone:

- Hard Pause to send the next set of numbers when you press talk.
- 2-Sec. Pause to automatically send the next set of numbers after two seconds.

Note: You can have multiple pauses in a phone number and combine 2 -second and hard pauses.

1. Enter the phone number and press Options (right softkey).
2. Select either Hard Pause or 2-Sec. Pause.
3. Enter additional numbers.
4. To dial the number, press thatr or (When dialing a number with a hard pause, press to send the next set of numbers.) - or-

To save the number in your Contacts, press Options (right softkey) > Save.

## Plus (+) Code Dialing

When placing international calls, use Plus Code Dialing to automatically enter the international access code for your location (for example, 011 for international calls made from Canada). This feature is subject to network availability.

1. Press and hold $+\mathbf{0}$ until a "+" is displayed on your phone screen.
2. Dial the country code and phone number you're calling, and press Tatr. (The access code for international dialing will automatically be dialed, followed by the country code and phone number.)

## Dialing from the Contacts List

1. Select (ます) > Contacts.
2. Select the entry you want to call and press (\%).
3. Highlight the number you wish to call and press taik.

Note: The icon next to each entry represents the labels (for example, Mobile, Home, Work, etc.) of the entry's default phone number. Triangles appears on the list if there are other phone numbers for the entry. Press the navigation key right or left to select other number.

## Using Speed Dialing

You can store up to 98 numbers in your phone's speed dial memory to make contacting friends and family as easy as pressing a key or two.

With this feature, you can dial your favourite entries using one key press for locations 2-9 or two key presses for locations 10-99. (See "Assigning Speed Dial Numbers" on page 68.)

## To use speed dial:

- From standby mode, press and hold the appropriate key for approximately two seconds.

The display confirms that the number has been dialed when it shows "Connecting...". To use Two-Touch Dialing (10-99), press the first digit, then press and hold the second digit.

## Using Abbreviated Dialing

Abbreviated Dialing is similar to speed dialing. You can use either of the following abbreviated dialing features.

- Contacts Match to retrieve any desired number saved in your Contacts by entering only the last three to six digits of the number. (See "To activate Contacts Match feature" on page 44.)
- Prepend to prepend the first five- or six-digit prefix you wish to use for abbreviated dialing, so that you can dial a number by entering only the last four or five digits of the number. Above feature becomes available when you enable Abbreviated Dialing feature. (See "To set your prepend number" on page 44.)


## To place a call using abbreviated dialing:

1. Enter the last 3-6 digits of a Contacts entry's phone number saved in your Contacts.

- or-

Enter the last four or five digits of your desired number to use the prepend feature.

## 2. Press talk or ming.

Note: If the Abbrev. Dial list is displayed, select the name or the number you want to call from the list, and then press talk to place a call.

## Entering Text

## Selecting a Character Input Mode

Your phone provides convenient ways to enter words, letters, punctuation, and numbers whenever you are prompted to enter text (for example, when adding a Contacts entry or when sending text messages).

1. When you display a screen where you can enter text, press

Mode (right softkey) to change the character input mode.
2. Select one of the following options and press

Note: The menus displayed vary according to the entry field. If you see triangles on the right of the menu, you can press the right and left navigation keys to switch between related menus.

- Alphabet to enter characters by using the keypad (see page 23).
- T9 Word to enter characters using T9 Text Input (see page 22).
- SYMBOL to enter symbols.
- SMILEYS to enter smiley pictures.
- Emoticons to enter an emotion icon.
- Web Shortcut to enter web shortcuts (for example, www., http://, or .com).
- Canned Msgs to enter canned messages (see page 38 and 95).
- Recent Msgs to enter messages used recently (if applicable).
- Paste List to paste copied or cut text (if applicable).
- NUMBER to enter numbers.
- From To Do to use words you added in your Calendar as To Do Items (see page 78).
- Signature to enter your signature (see page 39).
- Select Lang. to select the language (English or French).
- Delete All to delete all text (if applicable).
- Select Text to select stored text for copying or cutting.
- Add Word to store words that you use frequently.
- Text Options to display the Text Entry settings menu (see page 43).

## Entering Characters Using T9Text Input

T9 Text Input lets you enter text in your phone with just one keypress per letter. (To select the T9 Word mode when entering text, see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 21.)

T9 Text Input analyses the letters you enter using an intuitive word database and creates a suitable word. (The word may change as you type.) To accept a word and insert a space, press men or

Tip: In order to insert a space by pressing (\%) Auto-Space must be on (see page 43).

If you make a mistake, press to delete a single character.
Press and hold teand to delete an entire entry.

## Adding a Word to the T9 Database

If a word you want to enter does not display as an option when you are using T9 Text Input, you can add it to the database.

To add a word to the T9 Text Input database:

1. Press Mode (right softkey) > Add Word.
2. Enter the word using Alphabet Mode and press Save (left softkey).

To edit or delete the words you have added:

1. Press Mode (right softkey) $>$ Text Options $>$ My Words.
2. Highlight your desired word and press Options (right softkey).
3. Select an option and press (2义)

- Edit to edit a word in My Words.
- Delete to delete a word in My Words.

Note: You can add, edit, or delete a word from standby mode. Select (\%) > Settings > Text Entry > My Words.

## Customizing the T9 Settings

1. Press Mode (right softkey) > Text Options $>$ T9 Settings.

- or-

From standby mode, select $>$ Settings $>$ Text Entry $>$ T9 Settings.


- Word Predict to automatically display the word that may follow the current text input.
- Word Complete to show the completed words that match the keys you have entered without entering the whole word.
- Word Scan to allow T9 text input to recognize words by searching Contacts and messages.
- Word List to display word list.
- Show aft entr to select digits number (1-3 digits) to display the words choice list. The word choice list will be displayed based on the number of digits you selected.
- Show aft wait to select how many seconds the phone should wait to display the word choice list.

## Entering Characters Using Alphabet Mode

To enter characters using Alphabet mode, select the Alphabet mode (see "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 21). Press the corresponding key until the desired character appears. By default, the first letter of a word is capitalized and following letters are lowercased.

Characters scroll in the following order:

## Setting the Default Input Mode

1. Select $\stackrel{\text { Settings }}{ }>$ Text Entry $>$ Default Input.
2. Select an option and press

- T9 Word to select the T9 word mode for the initial entry mode.
- Alphabet to select the Alphabet mode for the initial entry mode.
- Retain Mode to set the retain mode on to retain the previous entry mode.

1. Select $>$ Settings $>$ Sounds $>$ Ringer Type.

## Adjusting the Phone's Volume Settings

1. Select \% $>$ Settings $>$ Sounds $>$ Volume.
2. Select Ringer, Earpiece, Headset, Speakerphone, Applications, or Start Up/Power Off.
3. Select a volume level and press Done (left softkey).

## Understanding Roaming

Recognizing Icons on the Display Screen
Your phone's display screen always lets you know when you're off the home network. Any time you are roaming, the phone displays the roaming icon ( $\mathbf{R}_{\text {alllll }}$ ).

## Roaming on Other Networks

When you're roaming, your call quality and security will be similar to the quality you receive when making calls on the home network. You may not be able to access certain features.

> Note: If you're on a call when you leave the home network and enter an area where roaming is available, your call is dropped. If your call is dropped in an area where you think service is available, turn your phone off and on again to reconnect to the home network.

## Setting Your Phone's Roam Mode

Your phone allows you to control your ability to roam. By using the Roaming menu option, you can determine which signals your phone accepts.

To choose from two different settings on your dual band/dual mode phone to control your roaming experience:

1. Select (ます) $>$ Settings $>$ More... $>$ Roaming.
2. Select an option and press

- Automatic to seek Service. When service is unavailable, the phone searches for an alternate system.
- Home Only to access the home network only and prevent roaming on other networks.

## Viewing History

History shows up to the 60 most recent phone calls you have placed, received, or missed. Each history entry contains the phone number (if available) and Contacts entry name (if the phone number is in your Contacts). Duplicate calls (same number and type of call) may only appear once on the list.

## To display History details:

- From standby mode, press talk or rever.
- Or -

Press History (left softkey).
The current day's history appears under Today, and the previous day's history appears under Yesterday. Other history includes date information.

## History Details

The History details screen shows the call type, phone number, and date and time of the call. An onscreen menu is also displayed according to the type of call. See "History Menu Options" shown below. To make a call from History details screen, press talk.

## History Menu Options

You may see several menu items on the onscreen menu or by pressing Options (right softkey).

- Call to dial the phone number.
- Call:Speaker On to dial the phone number in speakerphone mode.
- Save Contact to save a phone number. See "Saving a Phone Number from History" on next page.

- Delete All to delete all entries in the History. See "Deleting History" on page 62.
- Send Message to send a text message. See page 95 for details.
- New Group to access a Group entry menu to create a new Group entry. See "Making a New Group Entry from History" on page 61.
- Rename to change an entry's current name to Caller ID name.


## Making a Call from History

## To place a call from History:

1. From the History list display, highlight the entry you want to call.

Note: You cannot make calls from History to entries identified as No Caller ID, restricted ID (Private), or Unavailable ID.

Tip: You can also send a message when the left softkey displays the Send Msg option.

## Saving a Phone Number from History

Your phone can store up to 300 Contacts entries. Contacts can store up to a total of 500 phone numbers.

- New Entry to create a new Contacts entry for the number.

## About Contacts

Your phone can store up to 300 Contacts entries. Contacts can store up to 500 phone numbers, 600 email addresses, and 300 Web addresses.

## You can create two types of Contacts entries:

- Personal Contacts Entries (for individual contacts) - An entry for an individual. Each entry can contain up to seven phone numbers, two email addresses, and one Web address.
- Group Entries to send a text or picture message up to 25 group members simultaneously.


## Displaying the Contacts List

- Select (

If you highlight a name, the main (default) phone number is displayed. If a group entry is highlighted, a group icon and number of group members will also be displayed.

## Viewing History from Contacts

You can view the history of the selected Contacts entry from the Contacts list.

- Highlight the entry and press Options (right softkey) > Contact History.

## Creating a Personal Contacts Entry

Shortcut: Enter the phone number in standby mode and press . Proceed with steps 2-4 in "Saving a Phone Number" on page 17.

## 1. From the Contacts list display, select Add New $>$ New Contact.

2. Enter a name for the new entry and press the navigation key down.
3. Enter the phone number for the entry and press

## Finding Contacts Entries

## Secret Contacts Entries

You can hide an entry by making it secret. The entry is not displayed in your Contacts. In History, a telephone number is displayed but the Contacts entry's name is not.

To make an entry secret:

1. From the Contacts list display, select the Contacts entry you want to tag as secret and press Options (right softkey).
2. Select Set as Secret.
3. Select On. (Select Off if you do not want to tag as secret.)
4. From the Contacts list, press Options (right softkey) > Settings $>$ Hide Secret.
5. Enter your four-digit lock code.

To make an entry public:

1. From the Contacts list, press Options (right softkey) > Settings > Show Secret.
2. Enter your four-digit lock code.

Note: If you make an entry secret, calls cannot be made to that entry if Contacts Only is selected in Settings > More... > Restrict and Lock > Voice $>$ Restrict $>$ Outgoing Calls or Incoming Calls (see page 51).

Tip: If you never changed the lock code number and you can't recall your lock code, try using the last four digits of your phone number.

Use the Calendar to remind you of events or important calls you need to make. You can schedule up to 100 events, 15 Call Alarms and 20 To Do Items.

Displaying Your Calendar<br>- Select - Tools > Calendar.

Tip: The current day is framed by a rectangle.
Note: To use the Calendar function in a no-service area, set the actual time and date after turning off and on your phone.

## Setting Holidays

Set holidays to your calendar according to your needs.

## To set a holiday:

1. From the calendar display, highlight the date you want to set as a holiday.
2. Press Options (right softkey) $>$ Holiday.
3. Select an option and press

- Set Date to set the holiday for the date.
- SetWeekly to set the holiday for the same day, every week. Press Yes (left softkey) to set weekly holiday.

To reset or edit the added holidays:

1. From the calendar display, highlight the day you have set as a holiday.

Tip: Press Summer (left softkey) or Standard (right softkey) for changing between summer and standard time, if applicable. The icon is shown while summer time is displayed.

## Using the Calculator

1. Select
2. Enter numbers using your keypad. Press the left softkey to insert a decimal point.
3. Press the appropriate navigation key for an arithmetic option. (Up for addition, Down for subtraction, Left for multiplication, Right for division.)
4. Enter numbers and press for the result.

- To clear the numbers, press CLR (right softkey).


## 9. Voice Services

## Using Automatic Speech Recognition (ASR)

Your phone is equipped with an Automatic Speech Recognition (ASR) that allows you to make calls or launch phone functions using your voice. All you have to do is to talk into the phone, and ASR will recognize your voice and complete tasks by itself.

## Activating ASR

With the phone open:

- From standby mode, press and hold TALK or 표ing


## With the phone closed:

- Press and hold the operation button on your optional headset.

The phone displays "Say a command" screen and prompts you to say the name of the command you want to use. To complete your task, simply follow the voice prompts.

Available ASR commands are:

- Call to call an entry in your Contacts list or to the phone number you say. (See page 86 for details.)
- Go To <item or application> to jump directly to the menu items or applications. (See page 86 for details.)
- Check <item> to check your phone's status. (See page 87 for details.)

Note: Use ASR in a quiet environment so it can accurately identify your voice.
Tip: When you display a Command menu, say "More options" to display additional commands.
During ASR operation, press Help (left softkey) to get instructions for using the software.

## Making a Voice Call Using ASR

With ASR, you can make a voice call by reciting a name or phone number.

## 1. Press and hold talk or Eene

2. If you hear "Say a command," say "Call."
3. If you hear "Say the name or number," say a name or a phone number.
4. If you hear "Which Location?," say a phone type (for example, "Mobile").

Shortcut: To execute several commands at a time, you can say several commands in sequence (for example, "Call, John Jones, Mobile").

Note: If ASR does not recognize the name or number, it will find the most likely matches and display a list of up to three names or numbers. You will hear "Did you say..." followed by the name or number. You can confirm by saying "Yes." Say "No" to change the selection.

## Opening Menus Using ASR

You can jump directly to 17 menu items or applications by saying "Go to" followed by a menu option.

## 1. Press and hold talk or mine

2. If you hear "Say a command," say "Go to".
3. If you hear "Which shortcut?", say an application name (for example, "Messaging").

Shortcut: To execute several commands at a time, you can say several commands in sequence (for example, "Go to Messaging").

## Checking Phone Status Using ASR

You can use ASR to obtain information about your phone:

- My Phone Number
- Network
- Signal Strength
- Battery
- Status (all of the above except phone number)

1. Press and hold Talk or mon.
2. If you hear "Say a command," say "Check."
3. If you hear "Which status item?," say a command.

## ASR Options

To change ASR confirmation:

## 1. Press and hold tair or mind

2. Press Settings (right softkey) > Confirmation and select an option.

- Automatic to display the list and ask for your confirmation if the system is not sure what you said.
- Always Confirm to always display the list and ask for your confirmation.
- Never Confirm to never display the list and ask for your confirmation.

To adapt the system to your voice:

1. Press and hold TaLK or mex.
2. Press Settings (right softkey) $>$ Adaptation $>$ Adapt Voice.
3. Press Start (left softkey) and repeat each word, phrase, or telephone number you hear.

## To reset the adaptation:

1. Press and hold talk or mand
2. Press Settings (right softkey) > Adaptation $>$ Reset Voice.
3. Read the message and press Yes (left softkey) if you are certain you would like to reset.

## To change ASR mode:

1. Press and hold tralk or mewn.
2. Press Settings (right softkey) $>$ Modes and select an option.

- Expert Mode to sound a beep only.
- Prompt Mode to prompt for required information.
- Readout Mode to prompt for required information and to read aloud the content displayed on the main screen.


## To change ASR dialing region:

1. Press and hold taik or man.
2. Press Settings(right softkey) $>$ Dialing region and select an option.

- North America to recognize only numbers valid in North America.
- Other to recognize any number regardless of location.

To display ASR software version:

1. Press and hold talk or men.
2. Press Settings (right softkey) $>$ About.

## ManagingVoice/Call Memos

You can use your phone's voice recording to record brief memos to remind you of important events, phone numbers, or grocery list items and to record the other party's voice during a phone call.

## Recording Voice Memos

1. Select
2. Start recording after the beep.

## To end the recording of your memo:


Note: Your phone can store up to 100 voice memos. Maximum recording time is up to three minutes.

## Recording Call Memos

1. During a call, press Options (right softkey) $>$ Call Memo Rec.
2. Start recording after the beep.


- Recording also stops when the call is disconnected.

Note: Only the other party's voice is recorded during this process.

## Voice and Call Memo Options

1. Select $>$ Tools $>$ Voice Memo $>$ List.
2. Select a voice memo and press Options (right softkey).
3. Select an option and press

- Play to play selected voice memos or all voice memos.
- This to play the selected memo.
- Multiple to play selected memos.
- All to play all memos.

Note: Press Slow (left soffkey) or Fast (right softkey) to change playing speed.

- Speaker On or Speaker Off to activate or deactivate the speakerphone mode.
- Edit Title to edit the title of a voice memo.
- Properties to display information about a voice memo.
- Type Filter to display only voice memos or only call memos.
- Sort by to sort voice memos by time recorded, name, or file size.
- Delete to delete either selected memos or all memos.


## Deleting Voice and Call Memo

To delete an individual memo:

1. Select (ます) $>$ Tools $>$ Voice Memo $>$ List.
2. Highlight the memo you want to delete and press Options (right softkey) $>$ Delete $>$ This $>$ Yes (left softkey).

## To delete all memos:


2. Press Options (right softkey) $>$ Delete $>$ All $>$ Yes (left softkey).

To delete multiple selected recordings:

1. Select $\left.{ }^{\circ}{ }^{*}\right)^{\prime}>$ Tools $>$ Voice Memo $>$ List.
2. Press Options (right softkey) $>$ Delete $>$ Multiple.
3. Select the memos you want to delete and press Delete (left softkey) $>$ Yes (left softkey).

## Setting the Recording Mode

This feature allows you to match the sensitivity of the microphone to the type of recording you are making.

1. Select (\%) $>$ Tools $>$ Voice Memo $>$ Rec. Mode (right softkey).
2. Select an option and press (\%"):

- Dictation to record a single voice.
- Conference to record multiple voices.


## Setting Up Screen Call

You can screen incoming calls by using a recorded announcement, either a pre-recorded one or one that you record. You can also record the caller's message.

## Activating Screen Call

To start Screen Call when you have incoming calls:

- When the phone rings or vibrates, press Options (right softkey) > Screen Call.

To set Auto Screen Call:

1. Select
2. Set the answer delay by using numeric keys or by pressing the navigation key up or down.
3. Press or (left softkey). The icon is displayed on the screen.

Tip: While the caller's message is being recorded, press talk to answer the call, or press Enoo to stop recording and disconnect the call.

## Selecting an Announcement for Screen Call

1. Select ( Tools > Voice Memo > Screen Call > Announcement.
2. Depending on your preference, select Pre-Recorded or Custom.

## Recording Name for a Pre-Recorded Announcement

1. Select (\% ( Tools $>$ Voice Memo $>$ Screen Call $>$ Announcement.
2. Highlight Pre-Recorded and press Edit (right softkey) > Record Name.

- If your name has already been recorded, select Yes or No for overwriting.

3. Press (W) to start the 1st recording. (The maximum recording time is 12 seconds.)
4. Press to stop recording.
5. After the 1st recording, press again to start the 2nd recording.
6. Press to stop recording.

## Recording a Customized Announcement

1. Select (\%) > Tools > Voice Memo > Screen Call > Announcement.
2. Highlight Custom and press Edit (right softkey) $>$ Record.

- If your announcement has already been recorded, select Yes or No for overwriting.

3. Press to start the 1st recording. (The maximum recording time is 12 seconds.)
4. Press (
5. After the 1st recording, press again to start the 2nd recording.
6. Press to stop recording.

Reviewing an Announcement

1. Select (\% Tools > Voice Memo > Screen Call > Announcement.
2. Highlight Pre-Recorded or Custom and press Edit (right softkey) > Play or Play:Speaker.

## Deleting an Announcement

1. Select \% Tools $>$ Voice Memo $>$ Screen Call $>$ Announcement.
2. Highlight Pre-Recorded or Custom and press Edit (right softkey).
3. Select Delete Name or Delete. (A confirmation will be displayed.)
4. Press Yes (left softkey).

## 10. Messaging

## New Messages

You can set your phone to display an icon and message notification or just display an icon notification when you receive a new text message, picture message, or Web Alert. See "Setting Message Notification Display" on page 37.

## To view a new message with an icon and message notification:

A text message or a Web Alert will automatically appear on your phone's screen with $\bigoplus_{\mathrm{r}}$ icon. A picture message will automatically appear with the information of the message and p-icon. Press View (left softkey) to view the message.

## To view a new message with an icon notification or during other operations:

$\square_{\mathrm{T}}$ or $\mathrm{P}_{\mathrm{P}}$ icon will appear on your phone's screen. To view messages, see "Displaying Messages" on the next page.

Note: When there are two or more notifications, a Missed Alerts list displayed in standby mode. Highlight a text/picture message in the list and press View (left softkey) to display the message details.

- Press Call (left softkey) to dial the callback number.
- Press Reply (left softkey) to reply to the sender.
- Press G0 (left softkey) to go to the Web site.
- Press Forward (left softkey) to forward the message (appears only if there is no sender's phone number, email address, or callback number).
- Press Options (right softkey) to display options.


## Displaying Messages

To display a text message from the main menu:

1. Select $>$ Messaging.
2. Select Text > Inbox, Sent Mail, Pending, Drafts, or your defined folder and press
3. Select the message you want to see and press (To display the message options, press Options [right softkey].)

Note: When you have duplicated messages, 은 icon appears. After opening the messages, © icon will display.

## To display a picture message from the main menu:

1. Select (\% $>$ Messaging $>$ Picture Msg.
2. Select Inbox.
3. Select your desired picture message and press (2义'

To display Web Alerts:

1. Select $>$ Messaging $>$ Web Alerts.
2. Select the header of the message you want to see and press
(\%). (To display the Web Alerts options, press Options [right softkey].)
To read other messages:

- Press the navigation key right or left to read the next or previous message.

## Sending a Text Message

1. Select ( $>$ Messaging $>$ Send Message $>$ Text Message. Recent List is displayed.
2. Select the recipient from the Recent List and press

- Select Go to Contacts to select a recipient from your Contacts. Select a Contacts entry and press
- Press Group (left softkey) to select multiple recipients. After selecting recipients, press Continue (left softkey) to proceed.

Tip: You can also press New Addr. (right softkey) to enter a new address or a phone number.
3. Compose a message.

- To enter a message, use your keypad to type your message. Press Mode (right softkey) to select a character input mode. (See "Selecting a Character Input Mode" on page 21.)

4. Press Options to select additional options.
5. Review your message and press Send (left softkey).

Tip: You can also send a text message when the left softkey displays the Send Msg option.

## Using Canned Messages

Canned messages make sending text messages to your friends, family, and coworkers easier than ever.

1. Select $>$ Settings $>$ Messaging $>$ Canned Msgs.
2. Highlight a message you wish to send and press Options (right softkey) > Send Text.
3. Follow steps 2-5 in "Sending a Text Message" above.

## Accessing Email or Instant Messaging Provider

You can send an Email or Instant Message from your phone.

1. Select $>$ Messaging $>$ IM \& Email.
2. Select an instant messaging provider or an Email provider.
3. Follow the onscreen instructions to read, compose, send, or manage your messages or Emails.

## Creating Folders for Messages

You can create up to ten folders to store your Messages.
When 10 of your defined folders exist, the "Create Folder" option will not appear.

## To create a new folder:

1. Select (\%) $>$ Messaging $>$ Text.
2. Press Options (right softkey) $>$ Create Folder.
3. Enter a folder name and press (핪).
4. Press Save (left softkey).

To set an optional feature for the added folder:

1. During step 3 above, scroll down to select other menu options.

- Auto Filing to file messages into the folder automatically. The following options appear when this feature is set to on.
- Keyword to set a keyword for Auto Filing. Enter a keyword and press
- Notify to set the notification display to on or off when you have an unread message matching the defined folder.
- Envelope Icon to set the envelope icon display to on or off when you have unread message matching the defined folder.

2. Press Save (left softkey).

## ChangingAll Messages to Read

1. Select (\%) > Messaging > Text.
2. Highlight Inbox or a created folder by user (see "Creating Folders for Messages" on page 96).
3. Press Options (right softkey) > Chg. All to Read.
4. Press Yes (left softkey).

Tip: This option may not be displayed if you don't have any unread message in those folders.

## Deleting Messages

1. Select (ます) $>$ Messaging $>$ Text.
2. Select Inbox, Sent Mail, Pending, Drafts, or your defined folder and press
3. Highlight a message you want to delete and press Options (right softkey) > Delete.
4. Select This.

Tip: This option may not be displayed if you save only one message in a folder. To delete all messages, select All.
5. Press Yes (left softkey).

To delete multiple messages:

1. Open any message folder. (By following steps 1-2 above.)
2. Press Options (right softkey) $>$ Delete $>$ Multiple.
3. Press to select messages to be deleted.
4. Press Delete (left softkey).

To delete read messages:

1. Select (\% $>$ Messaging > Text > Inbox or your defined folder.
2. Press Options (right softkey) $>$ Delete $>$ Read.
3. Press Yes (left softkey).

## 11. Camera

## Taking Pictures

Taking pictures with your phone's built-in camera is as simple as choosing a subject, pointing the lens, and pressing a key. You can activate the phone's camera mode whether the phone is open or closed.

## To take a picture with the phone open:

1. Press and hold or the side camera key to activate camera mode. (Additional camera options are available through the camera mode Options menu. See "Camera Mode Options" on page 99.)

Tip: To activate camera mode, you can also select
2. Using the phone's Main Screen as a viewfinder, aim the camera lens at your subject.
3. Press (\%) Capture [left softkey], or the side camera key) until the shutter sounds. (The picture will automatically be saved in the In Phone folder.)

- To return to camera mode to take another picture, press , the side camera key, or mana.

4. Press Options (right softkey) for more options:

- Take Picture to return to camera mode to take another picture.
- Send Media to send your picture. (See page 105.)
- Post to Service to access available services. Select Update to display the latest services.
- Upload to upload the picture you just took to the online picture messaging web site. Depending on your settings, you may be prompted to accept an Internet connection.
- Review Media to go to In Phone folder to review your saved pictures.
- Set as to assign the picture. Select an option and press (अ)
- Delete to delete the picture you just took.
- Details/Edit to edit your picture or display details relating to your pictures.


## To take a picture with the phone closed:

1. Press and hold the side camera key to activate the camera mode.
2. Point the camera lens at your subject.
3. Press the side camera key to take the picture.

## Camera Mode Options

When the phone is open and in camera mode, press Options (right softkey) to display additional camera options:

- Picture Mode to select a picture mode from Normal, Beach/Snow, Scenery, Night/Dark or Soft Focus.
- Zoom to zoom in on a subject. (See "Using the Zoom" on page 101.)
- Self-Timer to activate the camera's timer. (See "Setting the Self-Timer" on page 100.)
- Fun Tools to select an option from the following:
- Multiple Shots to take multiple shots. (See "Taking Multiple Shots" on page 100.)
- Fun Frames to select your favourite fun picture frame to decorate your picture.
- Color Tone to select a wide variety of color tones for the picture.
- Image Controls to select an option from Brightness or White Balance.
- CameraSettings to select your settings. (See "Selecting Camera Settings" on page 101 for details.)
- Review Media to go to In Phone folder to review your saved pictures.
- Key Guidance to indicate the key functions in camera mode.
- User Settings to select your favourite setting. (See "Setting Your Favourite Mode" on page 101.)


## Setting the Self-Timer

## To activate the self-timer:

1. From camera mode, press Options (right softkey)> Self-Timer.
2. Highlight the length of delay you want the timer to use ( 10 Seconds or 5 Seconds) and press (\%ix).
3. Press Start (left softkey) when you are ready to start the timer. ( $\mathbf{U}$ ) appears on the upper right portion of the Main Screen during the self-timer countdown.)
4. Get ready for the picture. (When the timer is down to three seconds, the self-timer icon will turn red and the phone will begin to beep.)

To cancel the self-timer after it has started:

- Press Cancel (right softkey).

Note: While the self-timer is active, all keys are disabled except enoo, enca and Cancel (right softkey).

## Taking Multiple Shots

This feature allows you to take up to nine continuous shots in sequence. When you take multiple shots, the $\frac{M}{d}$ icon will be displayed in the viewfinder.

1. From camera mode, press Options (right softkey) $>$ Fun Tools $>$
Multiple Shots.
2. Select the number of shots and press (\%).
3. Select the duration of the interval between shots (Normal or Fast) and press (20).
4. Press to take the pictures. (The Multiple Shots folder will be displayed up to four thumbnail pictures per screen.)
5. Press Options (right softkey) to display picture options, or press to return to Camera mode to take another picture.

## Using the Zoom

This feature allows you to zoom in on an object when you take a picture. You can adjust the zoom from $1 x$ to 16x.

1. From camera mode, press the navigation key right or left, or the volume key up or down to adjust the zoom. (The gauge bar appears.)
2. Press Capture (left softkey), © or side camera key to take the picture.

## Setting Your Favourite Mode

With your phone, you can customize various camera settings. This feature allows you to save your favourite setting.

1. From camera mode, select your favourite setting. (See "Camera Mode Options" on page 99 and "Selecting Camera Settings" on this page.)
2. Press Options (right softkey) $>$ User Settings.
3. Highlight an unassigned number and press Add (right softkey) > Yes (left softkey).
4. Enter a title and press or 0 KK (left softkey).

## Selecting Camera Settings

1. From camera mode, press Options (right softkey) > CameraSettings.
2. Select an option and press

- Resolution to select a picture's file size (High-480x640, Med-240x320, or Low-120x160).
- Quality to select the picture quality setting (Fine, Normal, or Economy).
- Shutter Sound to select a shutter sound (Default, Say "Cheese," or "Ready").
- Status Bar to switch the status bar display on or off.


## Viewing Your Account Information

- Select ( ${ }^{2}$ Pictures $>$ Settings\&Info > Account Info.

## Storing Pictures

Your phone's picture and storage area is called My Albums.
There are two types of folders in My Albums:

- In Phone (see below)
- Online Albums (see page 108)

You can also use Assigned Media folder (see page 104).

## In Phone Folder

Your phone's internal storage area is called In Phone folder. From In Phone folder, you can view saved pictures in your phone, send them to the online picture messaging web site, delete images, and access additional options.

## To review your pictures saved in In Phone folder:

1. Select $>$ Pictures $>$ My Albums $>$ In Phone. (Thumbnails will be displayed up to four at a time.)
2. Use your navigation key to view and scroll through the pictures.

## In Phone Folder Options

When you are viewing In Phone folder, press Options (right softkey) to display the following options:

- Send Media to send your pictures. (See page 105 for details.)
- Upload to upload pictures from In Phone folder to the online picture messaging web site.
- Post to Service to access available services. Select Update to display the latest services.
- Set as to assign the picture. Select an option and press .
- Delete to delete pictures.

Note: Deleting data will free up memory space to enable you to take more pictures.

- Details/Edit to edit your picture or display details relating to your pictures.
- Slideshow to view your pictures in slideshow mode.
- Album List to display the album list.
- Camera Mode to activate camera mode.


## Assigned Media Folder

When you assign a picture, it will automatically be saved in Assigned Media folder. The folder allows you to store copies of pictures on your phone and to assign pictures to various phone tasks.

## To save a picture to Assigned Media folder:

1. From In Phone folder (see "In Phone Folder" on page 103), select a picture you wish to save to Assigned Media folder and press (.
2. Press Options (right softkey) > Set as.
3. Select an option and press in preview screen. (A copy of the picture will automatically be saved to Assigned Media folder.)

To view pictures stored in Assigned Media folder:

1. Select ${ }_{\left(\chi^{2}\right)}>$ Tools $>$ Assign. Media. (Thumbnails will be displayed up to four at a time.)
2. Use your navigation key to view and scroll.

## Sending Picture Messages

Once you've taken a picture, you can use the messaging capabilities of your phone to instantly share your picture with family and friends. You can send pictures to up to 25 people at a time using their email addresses or their phone numbers.

## Sending Pictures from In Phone Folder

## 1. Select $>$ Pictures $>$ My Albums $>$ In Phone.

2. Highlight a picture you wish to send and press ( (The check box in the lower right corner will be marked. You can select multiple pictures.)
3. Press Options (right softkey) > Send Media.
4. Follow the step 2 of "Sending a Text Message" on page 95.
5. If you wish to include a text message, scroll to Text, and then enter your message.
6. If you wish to include a voice message, scroll to Audio and press Record (right softkey) to record. (Maximum recording time is 10 seconds.)
7. To set the priority, scroll to Priority, and then select Urgent or Normal.
8. Confirm the recipients, message, voice message, and picture. (You may also select additional options by pressing the right softkey. Follow the onscreen instructions to add available options.)
9. Press Send (left softkey) to send the pictures.

## Sending Pictures from Messaging Menu

You can also send picture messages from your phone's Messaging menu.

1. Select $>$ Messaging $>$ Send Message $>$ Picture Msg.
2. Follow the step 2 of "Sending a Text Message" on page 95.
3. Select In Phone or Online Albums.
4. Use the navigation key to select the picture you wish to send and press (You can select multiple pictures.)
5. Press Next (left softkey). To complete and send the pictures, follow steps 5-9 in "Sending Pictures from In Phone Folder" on page 105.

Tip: To take and send a new picture, select Take Picture during step 3 above. Then take the new picture, and follow steps 5-9 in "Sending Pictures from In Phone Folder" on page 105
You can also send a picture message when the left softkey displays the Send Msg option.

## Managing Picture Messages

## Using the Online Picture Messaging Web Site

Once you have uploaded pictures from your phone to your online picture messaging account (see "Uploading Pictures" on this page), you can use your personal computer to manage your pictures. From the online picture messaging web site, you can share pictures, edit album titles, add captions, and organize images. You can even send your pictures to be printed at participating retail locations. You will also have access to picture management tools to improve and customize your pictures. You'll be able to lighten, darken, crop, add antique effects, add comic bubbles and cartoon effects, and use other features to transform your pictures.

To access the online picture messaging web site:

- From your computer's Internet connection, go to https://mypictures.bell.ca.


## Uploading Pictures

1. Select $\stackrel{\text { Wictures }}{ }>$ My Albums $>\operatorname{In}$ Phone.
2. Check the picture(s) you wish to upload, and then press Options (right softkey) $>$ Upload.
3. Select Selected or All.
4. Select "Uploads" Area or Other Albums.

## Managing Online Pictures from Your Phone

You can use your phone to manage, edit, or share pictures you have uploaded to your online picture messaging account.

1. Select $>$ Pictures $>$ My Albums $>$ Online Albums.
2. Highlight an album title and press to display thumbnail images.

Tip: If only "Uploads" folder exists, album list is not displayed and thumbnail images in the Uploads folder are displayed.
To switch a selected picture from thumbnail view to expand view mode, press Expand (left softkey).
3. Use your navigation key to select a picture.
4. Press Options (right softkey) to display your online picture options.

- Send Media to send your picture.
- Post to Service to access available services. Select Update to display the latest services.
- Set as to assign the picture.
- Save to Phone to download the pictures to In Phone folder.
- Delete to delete pictures saved in the current album (or Uploads folder).
- Copy/Move to copy or move pictures to a selected album.
- Details/Edit to edit your pictures or display details relating to your pictures.
- Media Filter to filter only pictures or to display all media files.
- Album List to display the album list.

Note: The online picture options may vary depending on the item you select.

## Downloading Your Online Pictures

From your online picture messaging albums display, you can select pictures to download to your phone's In Phone folder.

1. From the online pictures display, select the pictures you wish to download.
2. Press Options (right softkey) $>$ Save to Phone.

To access your Online Albums options from your phone:

1. Select $>$ Pictures $>$ My Albums $>$ Online Albums.
2. Use your navigation key to select an album (or Uploads folder).
3. Press Options (right softkey) to display your online album options.

- Edit/Delete to select an option from the following:
- Delete Album to delete the selected album.
- Rename Album to rename the selected album.
- Album Info to display detailed information about the album.
- Create Album to create a new album. Enter a new album name and press > Save (left softkey).

## 12. Bluetooth ${ }^{\circ}$

Bluetooth is a short-range communications technology that allows you to connect wirelessly to a number of Bluetooth devices, such as headsets, hands-free car kits, and Bluetooth enabled handhelds, computers, and wireless phones. The Bluetooth communication range is usually up to approximately 10 meters ( 30 feet).

## Accessing the Bluetooth Settings Menu

- Select


## Turning Bluetooth On and Off

By default, your phone's Bluetooth feature is turned off. Turning Bluetooth on makes your phone "available" to other in-range Bluetooth devices. To make your phone visible to other devices, you must also set your phone's visibility is not set to Hidden. (See page 113.)

1. From the Bluetooth Settings menu display, select On/Off.
2. Select On to enable Bluetooth. Select Off to disable Bluetooth.

Note: Enabling the Bluetooth settings affect the phone's talk and standby times.

## Bluetooth Status Indicators

The following icons show your Bluetooth connection status at a glance:

- B-Bluetooth feature is active (blue icon).
- $\$$ - Your phone is connected to a Bluetooth device (green icon).
- $\boldsymbol{F I T}^{-}$- Your phone is discoverable by another Bluetooth device.
- $\ddagger$ - Your phone is communicating with a Bluetooth device.


## Using the Bluetooth Menu

The Bluetooth menu allows you to use many functionality of your phone's Bluetooth service.

- Select (\%) Tools > Bluetooth to display the Bluetooth menu.
- Handsfree Pairing to find a Bluetooth headset or handsfree device and add it to your Trusted List.
- Send Contact to send the Contacts entry saved on your phone to another Bluetooth device.
- Send Biz Card to send your business card to another Bluetooth device.
- Add to Trusted to add a Bluetooth device to your Trusted List. You can select a device type to be searched.
- Trusted List to display a list of trusted Bluetooth devices. Select <Add New> to find another Bluetooth device.
- Select ( Tools > Bluetooth > More... to set Block List. See "Block List" on page 112.


## Find Me

If you are going to use a Bluetooth profile to pair with a
Bluetooth device, you will need to allow the other device to initiate pairing with your phone.

1. Select $>$ Tools $>$ Bluetooth $>$ Find Me (left softkey).
2. Follow the onscreen prompts to enter your PIN and press

## Block List

You can prevent other Bluetooth devices from connecting with your phone.

## To add a device to the Block List:

1. Select > Tools > Bluetooth > More... > Block List.
2. Select <Add New>.

## 3. Select Search or View Trusted.

- Search to search for devices to be added to the Block List.
- View Trusted to remove a device from the Trusted List and add it to the Block List.

4. Highlight a device you want to add to the Block List and press Block (left softkey).

## Block List Options

From the Block List, press Options (right softkey) to display the following options.

- Device Info to display the device's information.
- Unblock to remove the device from the Block List.
- Edit Name to edit the name of the device.
- Sort by to sort the devices.
- Help to display the Block List help.


## Using the Bluetooth Settings Menu

The Bluetooth Settings menu allows you to set up many of the characteristics of your phone's Bluetooth service, including:

- Setting your phone's visibility (or "discoverability") for other Bluetooth devices
- Choosing a device for your Bluetooth calls
- Entering or changing the name your phone uses for Bluetooth communication
- Displaying your phone's Bluetooth device information

1. Select (\%) > Settings > Bluetooth.
2. Select an option and press (\%义'

- On/Off to enable or disable Bluetooth.
- Visibility > Always Visible, Visible 3 min., or Hidden to set your Bluetooth visibility.
- Device Name to set a Bluetooth name for your phone.
- Device Info to display your phone's Bluetooth name, address, class and available services.
- Trusted List to display a list of trusted Bluetooth devices.
- Voice Priority to choose the default device you want to use for incoming and outgoing calls.


## Bluetooth Profiles

All the Bluetooth settings you configure are stored in your phone's Bluetooth user profile. Different profiles can be used for specific Bluetooth functions.

- HSP: Headset Profile - This profile functions as a wireless ear jack. When an incoming call is received, the ringer can be heard through the headset. While using your phone, you can use the headset instead of the phone by pushing a button on the headset, which has the same effect as inserting a jack into the phone. Increase or decrease the volume by using the volume key on the left side of the phone.

Note: To cycle between the phone's earpiece, speakerphone and a Bluetooth headset during a call, press

- HFP: Hands-Free Profile - This profile functions as a wireless car kit. Incoming calls ring to the hands-free headset or device. Calls can be received by pressing a button on the headset or device. For dialing, four functions are supported: recent call dial, voice dial, speed dial, and number dial. Increase or decrease the volume by using the volume key.
- DUN: Dial-Up Network Profile - This profile functions as a wireless data cable, connecting a PC or PDA to a network through your phone.
- OPP: Object Push Profile - This profile uses the Generic Object Exchange profile services to send data objects between devices and can be used to exchange Contacts and business cards (vCard).
- PBAP: Phone Book Access Profile - This profile enables exchange of Contacts information between devices. It is typically used between a car kit and a mobile phone to allow the car kit to display the name of the incoming caller.


## Pairing Bluetooth Devices

The Bluetooth pairing process allows you to establish a trusted connection between your phone and another Bluetooth device. When devices are paired, a passcode (PIN Code) is shared between devices, allowing for fast, secure connections while bypassing the discovery and authentication process.

1. Select
2. Select an option and press

- Handsfree Pairing to find a headset or hands-free device.
- Add to Trusted to find a device per device type. Select a device type to be searched.
- Trusted List to find all type device. Select <Add New> to start searching.

3. Select the device you wish to pair with and press
4. Enter the PIN and press (When the owner of the other device enters the same PIN, the pairing is complete.)
5. Edit the device name and press

## Using the Trusted List Options

Once you have created paired devices, several options are available from the Trusted List.

1. From the Trusted List, highlight a device.
2. Press Options (right softkey) to display the following options:

- Connect or Disconnect to connect to or disconnect from the Bluetooth device (if applicable).
- Send Item to send an item saved on your phone to another Bluetooth device (if applicable).
- Edit Name to edit the name of the trusted device.
- Auto-Accept to configure your phone's accessibility to other Bluetooth devices. (See "Setting Automatic Paring" shown below.)
- Device Info to display the trusted device's information.
- Sort by to sort the trusted devices.
- Delete to delete the selected device from the list.
- Delete All to delete all devices from the list.
- Settings to display the Bluetooth settings menu. (See page 113.)
- Help to display the Trusted List help.


## Setting Automatic Paring

You can configure your phone's accessibility to other Bluetooth devices.

1. From the Trusted List, highlight a device and press Options (right softkey) > Auto-Accept.
2. Select a setting and press

- On to allow the Bluetooth device to initiate a connection without any confirmation.
- Off to display a confirmation screen from which you can accept or deny a connection.


## Sending Data via Bluetooth

You can send data saved on your phone to another Bluetooth device.

1. From the Trusted List, highlight the device and then press Options (right softkey) $>$ Send Item.
2. Select your desired item (Business Card or Contacts) and press (\%).
3. Follow the onscreen instructions to select the item(s) to send.
4. Make sure the other device is ready to receive data, and then press Send (left softkey).
5. If necessary, enter the PIN and press (\%")

Note: Due to different specifications and features of other Bluetooth-compatible devices, display and operations may be different, and functions such as transfer or exchange may not be possible.

## 13. Service Features

## Using Voicemail

All unanswered calls to your phone are automatically transferred to voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off.

## New Voicemail Message Alerts

When you receive a new voice message, your phone alerts you and prompts you to call your voicemail by:

- Displaying a message on the screen.
- Sounding the assigned ringer type.
- The LED blinking red.
- Displaying

To call your voicemail:

- Press talr.
- Or-

Select (ま Messaging > Voicemail > Call Voicemail or
Call:Speaker On if you select Icon Only in Notification setting.
(See "Setting Message Notification Display" on page 37.)
To display your missed alerts:

- Select

## Retrieving Your Voicemail Messages

- Press and hold © (Your phone will dial your voicemail box.)

Select ( Messaging > Voicemail > Call Voicemail.

## Editing Your Voicemail Number

You may need to change the number to retrieve your voicemail.

## To change the number:

## 1. Select $\stackrel{\text { \% }}{ }$ ( Messaging $>$ Voicemail $>$ Edit Voicemail\#.

2. Edit your voicemail number and press

To reset your voicemail number:

1. Select $>$ Messaging $>$ Voicemail $>$ Edit Voicemail\#.
2. Press Options (right softkey) $>$ Reset Voicemail\# $>$ Yes (left softkey).

## Responding to Call Waiting

When you are on a call, Call Waiting alerts you to incoming calls by sounding beeps. Your phone's screen informs you that another call is coming in and displays the caller's phone number (if available).
To respond to an incoming call while you're on a call:

- Press talk. This puts the first caller on hold and answers the second call.

To switch back to the first caller:

- Press talk again.

## Making a Three-Way Call

With Three-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be charged for each of the two calls.

1. Enter a number you wish to call and press Thir or mane
2. Once you have established the connection, press to to put the first caller on hold.

## 3. Select Contacts, Recent History, or Enter Phone\#.

4. Choose a number from your Contacts or Recent History, or enter it directly, and press talk.
5. When you're connected to the second party, press TALK or Join (right softkey) again to begin your three-way call.

If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all three callers are disconnected.

## Web

With Web access on your phone, you will be able to browse full-color graphic versions - not just text versions - of your favourite website, making it easier than ever to stay informed while on the go. Check sports scores, trade stocks, and shop all on your phone anywhere on the Home network.

## Launching the Web

- Press Web (right softkey).
- Or -

Select (\%) > Web.

## Net Guard

With the Net Guard setting, the confirmation display will appear to connect to the Internet. This feature helps you avoid accidental connections. You can disable the Net Guard in the future by selecting Always Auto-Connect when the Net Guard is displayed.

- Select (\%) $>$ Settings $>$ More... $>$ Internet $>$ Net Guard.
- On to enable the Net Guard.
- Off to disable the Net Guard.


## Browsing the Web

## Creating a Bookmark

Bookmarks allow you to store the address of your favourite websites for easy access at a later time.

1. Launch the Web page you want to mark.
2. Press the right softkey to go to the browser menu.
3. Select Mark this page $>$ Save (left softkey).

## Accessing a Bookmark

1. Launch the Web and press the right softkey to access the browser menu.
2. Select View Bookmarks.
3. Highlight the bookmark you wish to access and press (ఊ (or press the number corresponding to the bookmark you wish to access).

## Editing a Bookmark

1. Access View Bookmarks menu. (See "Accessing a Bookmark" above.)
2. Highlight the bookmark you wish to edit and press the right softkey.
3. Select Edit.
4. Press to edit the address or title.
5. Press 0 OK (left softkey) $>$ Save (left softkey).

## Deleting a Bookmark

1. Access View Bookmarks menu. (See "Accessing a Bookmark" shown above.)
2. Highlight the bookmark you wish to delete and press right softkey.
3. Select Delete. (A confirmation screen will be displayed.)
4. Press Yes (right softkey) to remove the bookmark.

## Going to a Specific Website

1. Launch the Web and press the right softkey to display the browser menu.
2. Select Go to URL... > Input Address.
3. Enter the URL of the website you wish to go to, and press (अ")

Note: Not all websites are viewable on your phone.

## Reloading a Web Page

1. Launch the Web and press the right softkey to display the browser menu.
2. Select Refresh this page. (The browser will reload the current Web page.)

## Restarting the Web Browser

If the Web browser seems to be malfunctioning or stops responding, you can usually fix the problem by simply restarting the browser.

1. Launch the Web and press the right softkey to display the browser menu.
2. Select More... > Restart Browser.

## Sending a Web Page

This feature allows you to send a URL (Web site address) you're viewing through text messaging.

1. Launch the Web and press the right softkey to display the browser menu.

## 2. Select Send Page.

3. To complete and send a Web Page, follow steps 2-5 in "Sending a Text Message" on page 95.

## Adjusting the Browser Sound Volume

1. Launch the Web and press the right softkey to display the browser menu.
2. Select More... > Preferences > Sound Volume.
3. Select your desired volume level by pressing the navigation key and press (\%).

## Downloading through the WirelessWeb

Your phone allows you to download images (screen savers), ringers, games, etc., from a website.

1. Select (\%) > My Downloads.
2. Select your desired data folder (for example, Games, Ringers, Screensavers, or Applications).
3. Select Get New to start up the browser.
4. Select your desired image or ringer file, and follow the system prompts.

## 14. Safety Guidelines

## Maintaining Your Phone's Peak Performance

- To maximize performance, do not touch the lower back portion of your phone where the internal antenna is located while using the phone.
- Speak directly into the mouthpiece.
- Avoid exposing your phone and accessories to rain or liquid spills. If your phone does get wet, immediately turn the power off and remove the battery.
- Do not expose your phone to direct sunlight for extended periods of time (such as on the dashboard of a car).
- Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending, or sitting on it.
- Any changes or modifications to your phone not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment and void your authority to operate this equipment.


## Using Your PhoneWhile Driving

Talking on your phone while driving (or operating the phone without a hands-free device) is prohibited in some jurisdictions. Laws vary as to specific restrictions.

- Let the person you are speaking to know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions.
- Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving.


## Following Safety Guidelines

To operate your phone safely and efficiently, always follow any special regulations in a given area. Turn your phone off in areas where use is forbidden or when it may cause interference or danger.

## Using Your Phone Near Other Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from radio frequency (RF) signals. However, RF signals from wireless phones may affect inadequately shielded electronic equipment.

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic operating systems and/or entertainment systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or their representative to determine if these systems are adequately shielded from external RF signals. Also check with the manufacturer regarding any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Consult the manufacturer of any personal medical devices, such as pacemakers and hearing aids, to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF signals.

Note: Always turn off the phone in health care facilities and request permission before using the phone near medical equipment.

## Turning Off Your Phone Before Flying

Turn off your phone or set your phone to Airplane mode before boarding any aircraft. To prevent possible interference with aircraft systems, Transport Canada regulations require you to have permission from a crew member to use your phone while the plane is on the ground.

## Turning Off Your Phone in Dangerous Areas

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn your phone off when in a blasting area or in other areas with signs indicating two-way radios should be turned off. Construction crews often use remote-control RF devices to set off explosives.

Turn your phone off when you're in any area that has a potentially explosive atmosphere. Although it's rare, your phone and accessories could generate sparks. Sparks can cause an explosion or fire, resulting in bodily injury or even death. These areas are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include:

- Fuelling areas such as gas stations.
- Below deck on boats.
- Fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities.
- Areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust, or metal powders.
- Any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle's engine.

Note: Never transport or store flammable gas, liquid or explosives in the compartment of your vehicle that contains your phone or accessories.

## Restricting Children's Access to Your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Do not allow children to play with it as they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your telephone bill.

## Protecting Your Battery

The guidelines listed below help you get the most out of your battery's performance.

- Use only approved batteries and chargers. These chargers are designed to maximize battery life. Using other batteries or chargers voids your warranty and may cause damage.
- In order to avoid damage, charge the battery only in temperatures that range from $0^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ to $45^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(32^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right.$ to $\left.113^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right)$.
- Don't store the battery in a high humidity environment.
- Don't use the battery charger in direct sunlight or in high humidity areas, such as the bathroom.
- Never dispose of the battery by incineration.
- Keep the metal contacts on top of the battery clean.
- Don't attempt to disassemble or short-circuit the battery.
- Don't store the battery in high temperature areas for long periods of time. It's best to follow these storage rules:

Less than one month:
$-20^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ to $60^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(-4^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right.$ to $\left.140^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right)$
More than one month:
$-20^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ to $45^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\left(-4^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right.$ to $\left.113^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\right)$

## Disposal of Lithium Ion (Li-Ion) Batteries

For safe disposal options of your Li-lon batteries, please ensure that disposal of this in accordance with law and regulation.

- Do not dispose of the battery in fire; the cell may explode.
- Do not open or puncture the battery; the released electrolyte is corrosive and may cause damage to the eyes and skin.

Special Note: Be sure to dispose of your battery properly. In some areas, the disposal of batteries in household or business trash may be prohibited.

Note: For safety, do not handle a damaged or leaking Li-Ion battery.

## Cautions

Any changes or modifications to your phone not expressly approved in this document could void your warranty for this equipment and void your authority to operate this equipment. Only use approved batteries, antennas and chargers. The use of any unauthorized accessories may be dangerous and void the phone warranty if said accessories cause damage or a defect to the phone.

Although your phone is quite sturdy, it is a complex piece of equipment and can be broken. Avoid dropping, hitting, bending or sitting on it.

[^5]:    Note: The Uploads folder cannot be erased or renamed.

[^6]:    Note: You are charged for airtime minutes when you are accessing your voicemail from your phone.

[^7]:    Note: Call Waiting may not be available while roaming off the home network.
